The Adelaide Male Voice Choir welcomes **Jim Wilson** to its Second Tenor Section. Here in his own words is a brief account of Jim's adventures in the worlds of business and music:

I was always going to be an accountant – both by nature and nurture.

My father was an accountant in his own public practice and there were many school holidays where I was in his office, answering the telephones (some of you may be of an age to remember the corded plug switchboards), doing the rounds of banks, post office and general deliveries. His office was on the corner of Pirie Street and King William Street on the first floor and I remember sleeping in the office one night so that we could see the parade of Queen Elizabeth pass by. That must have been during the early to mid-1950s. Then there were the John Martin's Christmas Pageants, where I had a great view and was sheltered from all weather.

At school, maths was one of my top subjects; I enjoyed the exposure to an accounting practice, so it was no surprise that I joined an accounting firm (not my father's) after completing Leaving Certificate and then went to night school to gain my Chartered Accounting degree.

My father died at a relatively young age from a heart attack (he was 67) so at the age of 34, I purchased his practice and commenced my career as a sole practitioner. I sold the practice in 2000 and I then concentrated on being a manufacturer, as well as continuing a small accounting practice. Getting into manufacturing was, perhaps, an odd choice as I have no practical experience in that field, but it arose quite by chance. One of my clients had a manufacturing business in Magill that had been commenced by their grandfather more than a hundred years before and the third generation was nearing retirement age with no-one in the fourth generation interested in the business. Apart from that, the real estate on which the business operated was far more valuable than the meagre profits the business generated could justify. They sold the land and were going to close the doors. Another of my clients (experienced in practical operations) and myself took over the business and its seven employees.

The business is now in the safe hands of our

former manager and the business is flourishing.


I came to music via a circuitous route. I sang in my Primary School Choir at the Thousand Voice Choir Festival in the Adelaide Town Hall in 1957 as a descant but, after that I, had no real contact with music until about four years later when my Sunday School class was asked to audition for the church choir. When it was intimated that I "could not sing in tune" I went into self-imposed exile as a singer.

Quite some years later, I became exposed to singing once again when my two younger daughters joined the Adelaide Girls Choir (now Young Adelaide Voices).

That choral experience affected my accounting practice to the extent that I found auditing to be a completely negative experience as opposed to the positive, uplifting involvement in music (left brain v right brain involvement). I gradually relinquished the auditing side of my business.

My wife, Deb, gave me for my sixtieth birth-day some singing lessons which I thoroughly enjoyed and then was encouraged by my teacher to become involved in choirs. It was not, however, until I joined the AMVC that I finally felt fully comfortable being in a choir and I am gradually gaining in confidence. Deb likes to say she "discovered my voice". I cannot disagree!

Many thanks to Bill Shaw and the AMVC for giving me the opportunity to experience the wonder and joy of choral singing.

## A CHORAL TOUR TO ORANGE

Following discussions between our Music Director and the Orange Male Voice Choir, it was decided that, yes, we would travel up there and contribute to their 90th anniversary celebration concert.

And so it was that on a Friday morning early in November, a group of our choristers and some of their partners arrived at Adelaide Airport to be greeted by the warm smile of a QANTAS staffer, who obviously picked us by the smart new maroon polo tops we were sporting. "Group check-in? No problem", she cheerfully announced, then led us to a separate quiet desk, away from the shuffling queues! Two hours later we were in Sydney, collected our baggage and were on a bus and on our way over the Blue Mountains into country NSW.

Late afternoon, after having threaded our way through the delightful streets of Orange, we tumbled out of our coach straight into a school-room, where renowned guest conductor Paul Jarman was already putting our hosts, the Orange Male Voice Choir, through their paces. We cheerfully mingled into their sections and immediately sensed the warmth of country hospitality! We sang together as if we'd been one body for years!

Dinner that evening was a delightful affair at the well-appointed Duntry League Golf Club, where we mingled, laughed and chatted away the evening, sharing stories and jokes.

Next day we were back at the school with Emeritus Conductor Leon Paix for the morning. After a light lunch we made our way to the concert venue Orange Civic Theatre for staging, rehearsals and sound-checks with two children's choirs thrown into the mix, Woden Valley Youth Choir and Kinross Wolaroi School Koristers. While the men rehearsed, our partners were treated to warm hospitality from the Orange ladies with sight-seeing, boutique shopping, home-made cakes and a picnic lunch. That evening we all sang to a delighted audience in a packed theatre! It was an exciting and varied program and included, in addition to the singers, a brass ensemble for good measure.

Up again on Sunday morning and on board a bus to take us to a church service celebrating the Feast of All Saints at St John's Anglican Church in Molong, where we and the Woden Valley Youth Choir contributed choral items. We were served with a lovely buffet lunch at the church, after which we were driven in the opposite direction where we performed with the OMVC again at the Millthorpe Public School Hall. The choir items were preceded by the smallest children of the school singing *Rubber Ducky*, with actions!

A short rest at the motel, though some went on short sightseeing tours, then off to dinner with our hosts at the Hotel Canobolas. Gifts were exchanged, speeches made, laughter shared, and friendships forged.

Alas, all good things come to an end, so next morning it was back again across the mountains and on to the flight back to Adelaide, a little weary perhaps, but brimming with satisfaction and a bunch of happy memories.
